William "Bill" Houck May 25, 1914 ~ January 29, 2011 Clara Metcalf Houck August 10, 1916 ~ February 2, 2011 Bill Houck, 96 and Clara (Metcalf) Houck, 94 of Chittenango passed away last week. Bill was born in Hamden, NY, the son of Willmott and Anna Armstrong Houck. He drove a school bus, worked at Metcalf's Hardware Store, and was the owner of Bill's Fix It Shop. In addition to his love of fishing, hunting, caning chairs and digging ginseng, he was a trustee of the Chittenango United Methodist Church, volunteered at the Canal Boat Museum and supported the American Field Service (foreign exchange student) in central New York, guiding and assisting youth in our village. Bill was predeceased by three brothers, Charles, Raymond and Willmott, & two sisters Hila and Ida. Clara was born in Chittenango, NY, the daughter of Benjamin Franklin and Mildred Metcalf. She was a lifetime resident graduating from Chittenango High School in 1934 and SUNY Albany in 1939 with a degree in Library Science and took additional classes at SU School of Information Studies. Clara worked for 25 years as an Elementary School Librarian in the Chittenango Central School District where she acted not only as an educator but as a guide and mentor to the youth of Chittenango. She was an active member of the United Methodist Church, O.E.S. Beatrice Chapter No. 398 and Silver Star No. 21, Chittenango Canal Boat Museum, CNY Postcard Club, Madison County Historical Society as well playing a major role in the growth of the community. Clara, with her love of reading and children, played a critical role in the establishment of the Sullivan Free Library

and her passion for L. Frank Baum and the Wizard of Oz led her to initiate the annual tribute that has taken place for the last 32 years. Clara enjoyed history and genealogy serving for many years as genealogist for both Madison County and the Village of Chittenango. Clara was predeceased by a brother Walter and a sister Lucille.

They are survived by three sons; William (Joyce) Houck, Jr. of Brant Lake, Ralph (Mary) Houck of Port Matilda, PA, and Raymond (Sharon) Houck of Chittenango; a daughter Barbara (Robert) Sgroi of Canastota; Bill's three sisters Eva Bailey of Dowling Park, FL; Thelma Palmer of Bainbridge and Harriet (Robert) Wisse of Bullock, NC, and Clara's sister Frances Grasmeyer; nine grandchildren Russell, Roger (Melanie), Heather (Sterl), Kirsten (David), Karl (Angie), L. Catherine, Ami (Mike), Brandon and Kyle; four great grandchildren Stephanie, Holden, Trace, and Zoe; cousin Charlotte Houck of Binghamton, numerous nieces and nephews. Other family members include: Steve Merritt of Apache Junction, AZ, Clement (Lydia) Obonyo of Kampala, Uganda and Bent Jensen of Viborg, Denmark. Bill and Clara were married for 69 years. No family or community was ever so blessed.

“Living in Chittenango and being lucky enough to know Bill and Clara Houck on a couple of different levels will always be something I will treasure. Bill was my elementary school bus driver. As a child, you sensed right away that he loved children. Later on I knew him as Clara's biggest fan and protector. Clara was my librarian at school, and I remember how excited she got when she read to us or worked with us in the library. She was also a friend of my father's as a child, and having lost him at age 6, was one of the few who kept memories of him alive for me. As Clara's eyesight got worse, Bill would worry and tell me that now HE was her eyes. He couldn't really see any better than she could! But “mother was having trouble seeing” and his answer was that he would do it for her! He appreciated people saying things about Clara and honoring her and her work. I always felt like the first thing he conveyed to you without words after he thanked you was, that he was glad you were smart enough to know how much you owed to Clara. Again, he WAS her biggest fan! I loved listening to Bill play the harmonica, and enjoyed the look on his face whenever he presented a special hand-made cane to one of the munchkins or special Oz guests. She was pleased that I was interested in the Baum/Oz history in Chittenango, and hoped that it would keep on in her absence. “ Chittenango without Bill and Clara Houck? It will just never be the same. They seemed to be indestructible and one hoped they might go on for many years to come. They were the driving force behind the annual Oz festival, particularly Clara who was literally the “founder” of the now 32-year-old event. I was very saddened when I received the news of Bill’s death, one of the great people of this world who loved playing the harmonica and fashioning walking sticks (I still have mine!) among other things. Sadder still was the news of Clara’s death so soon after Bill’s, but now they will always be together somewhere over the rainbow. I was honored to be asked to speak at a stamp cancellation ceremony honoring Clara organized by Barbara Evans and held at the Chittenango High School on June 5, 2009, the Oz-Stravaganza weekend. I have a lovely picture of the three of us together at the event. In addition to her expertise as a librarian and educator, Clara was also an expert on the Baum family even writing a brief, but concise history of Baum titled “Journey to Oz” published in 1983. She was always willing to share her knowledge and research to anyone who came knocking at her door unannounced to “pick her brains. One of her favorite past times was clipping Oz-related newspaper articles and preserving them in dozens of scrap books, which she eventually donated to the Oz Museum (now housed in the Sullivan Free Library, an institution which Clara was instrumental in establishing) along with many of her Oz collectibles. What I remember most, however, is the many, many years of sitting on Bill and Clara’s porch on Main Street to watch the Oz festival parade and sample the snacks that Clara always generously provided. Later they moved to senior housing in Manlius to be better taken care of, but still often came to the parade through the kindness of their son. I’ll still attend the festival, but somehow the visit will always be tinged with sadness because Bill and Clara will only be there in spirit.
